are most proud of is hand-feeding the birds that we sell, with the exception of the Parakeets,” he explained. “The Cockatiels and Conures are all hand-fed, they are used to people, they want to be on your shoulder. They want affection from you.”

Also available in abundance are fish. This makes sense, given the pair got their start with a backyard Koi pond business years ago.

“About 15 years ago, we had a pond business in our backyard,” Paul Wheeler said. “We sold lots of pond supplies and lots of Koi fish and we really enjoyed it.”

“It started with fish,” he said.

“We know fish, it's what we know best,” Kindi Wheeler added. “It is a passion for both of us.”

When that business closed, they eventually decided to open Fin N Fur II.

“We always wanted to have a little fish store,” he said. The purchase of some fish tanks when the old Walmart closed led to an expanded vision and Fin N Fur II was born.

“It blossomed into this,”

Paul Wheeler said. He added with a laugh that Kindi knows more about pets than he does.

“My wife is much more knowledgeable than I am. So I am nice to people and I ask her questions,” he said with a laugh.

“Growing up I always had pets,” Kindi Wheeler agreed. “My father would bring home raccoons! He taught us a lot when we were kids about all our animals.”

As luck would have it, customer Kelly Wilson walked up during this part of the conversation. Wilson said she purchased Koi pond supplies from the couple at their former business and was shopping Friday for water lilies for her pond.

She spoke enthusiastically about the pond, which she described as a oasis of peace and tranquility for her.

The store held a soft opening a couple of months back, and the owners have already gained a reputation for wanting to help customers be good, responsible pet owners. They walk potential pet owners through the process and make sure they are ready to take on the responsibility. They have even been known to discourage own-

ership of certain pets, if they feel the new animal would not fit in with the pre-existing household.

The Netherland Dwarf rabbits for example are completely house trainable. A free-roaming rabbit, however, is obviously a no-no in a house with a cat. Not all pets fit in with all families, Paul Wheeler said.

When the Wheelers set a family up with a pet, they make sure they are ready to go when they leave the store.

“We want them to have everything they need,” Paul Wheeler said.

“And be educated, making sure it's going to fit in with your home and with your family,” Kindi Wheeler added. “If you don't have a cage, we will set that cage up for you. From the bedding to the food, before you leave, we will make sure you understand how to care for the pet.”

One thing you won't find at Fin N Fur II is cats and dogs. “We don't do anything dog and cat,” said Kindi Wheeler. “We specialize more in exotic pets.”

Fin N Fur II is open 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Wednesday through Friday. Saturday the store closes at 5 p.m. Check the store for new pets Wednesdays.

New Dem Party chairman Perez pledges to repair, unite party

ATLANTA — Newly elected Democratic national chairman Tom Perez pledged on Sunday to unite a fractured party, rebuild at all levels from “school board to the Senate” and reach out to chunks of rural America left feeling forgotten in the 2016 election.

Speaking in television interviews, Perez indicated that an important first step was joining with vanquished rival Minnesota Rep. Keith Ellison, who agreed at Perez’s invitation to serve as the Democratic National Committee’s deputy chairman. Perez said the two would work hard to put out an affirmative party message while opposing President Donald Trump’s policies, adding that he and Ellison were already getting a “good kick” that Trump was stirred to tweet that the DNC election was “rigged.”

“We lead with our values and we lead with our actions,” Perez said, describing a party focus that will emphasize protecting Social Security, Medicare and “growing good jobs in this economy.”

“You know, our unity as a party is our greatest strength. And it’s his worst nightmare,” he said. “And, frankly, what we need to be looking at is

whether this election was rigged by Donald Trump and his buddy Vladimir Putin.”

The former labor secretary in the Obama administration acknowledged that swaths of the U.S. had felt neglected, saying he had heard from rural America that “Democrats haven’t been there for us recently.”

“That’s exactly what we’re going to do,” Perez said, stressing grass-roots efforts in all 50 states. He pointed to

Democrats’ success Saturday in one of their strongholds, Delaware, where they found themselves in an unexpectedly competitive race.

Stephanie Hansen won a special election for a state Senate seat after vigorous party campaigning that helped preserve Democrats’ control of the chamber.

As DNC chair, Perez must now rebuild a party that in the last decade has lost about 1,000 elected posts from the

White House to Congress to the 50 statehouses, a power deficit Democrats have not seen nationally in 90 years.

On Saturday, the DNC elected Perez as its chair in a competitive race that took two rounds of voting — unprecedented in recent memory for either major party. They picked Perez, who was backed by former President Barack Obama, over Ellison, backed by liberal Sen. Bernie Sanders of Vermont.

Aide: Trump not elected to spend time with reporters, celebs

WASHINGTON — The White House says that when President Donald Trump skips the White House Correspondents’ Association dinner, expect him to spend that Saturday night in April “focused on what he can do to help better America.”

The dinner attracts politicians, journalists and celebrities and is typically attended by the president, who’s often roasted.

Trump isn’t saying why he won’t be there. He has railed against “the fake news media,” saying it is “the enemy of the American people.”

Spokeswoman Sarah Huckabee Sanders says it’s “kind of naive of us to think that we can all walk into a room for a couple of hours and pretend that some of that tension isn’t there.”

She tells ABC’s “This Week” that Trump wasn’t elected “to spend his time with reporters and celebrities.”

Daughter to bury father missing for 50 years in Vietnam

SAN DIEGO (AP) — More than half a century ago, Deborah Crosby was sent home from the first grade to find military officers

in her living room and her mother distraught: Her father’s Navy plane had been shot down in northern Vietnam, and he was presumed dead, though his body had not been found.

Her mother could never talk about that day, but she gave Crosby and her three brothers a binder with articles about her father’s plane

zooming low through the clouds on a bomb damage assessment mission before it was gunned down by North Vietnamese ground forces in 1965. The 31-year-old pilot was armed only with cameras, his daughter said.

Crosby and her grandmother made a pact to someday bring home the

remains of Lt. Cmdr. Frederick P. Crosby and bury him in his hometown of San Diego.

A year ago, military investigators found his remains. On Friday, Deborah Crosby fulfilled that promise to her late grandmother by receiving her father’s casket at the airport in San Diego.

Passengers watched

through the windows of a Delta Air Lines jet as the flag-draped casket was removed from the hold by six sailors.

Deborah Crosby walked forward, touched the casket and embraced her three brothers. The aviator’s elderly sister, Sharon, and brother, David, also hugged, and he wiped an eye.

“It’s nice to be able to let out the tears and have some relief in our hearts,” Deborah Crosby said.

The sailors saluted before the casket left in a hearse.

On Sunday, Frederick Crosby will be buried at Fort Rosecrans National Cemetery with full military honors and a Navy flyover.

both an enjoyable and educational opportunity, and certainly one I'll never forget. First, I wanted to know all the details about how my work would be displayed, and what the basic message was before I would even agree to usage. She stepped right up to the plate and gave it to me with both barrels, and straight between the eyes. Needless to say, trust was established right off the bat. That paved the way for a better program I believe. It's been a real pleasure working with them.

DI: What all did you initially include in your contribution to 60 Minutes?

DJ: Initially Joyce contacted me. Based on what they had seen online which was the same thing I contracted previously with CBS, they were ready to go with that source alone. But I sweetened the pot a little. Normally, all stringer video is published with what we call "the bug" in the upper right hand corner of the screen. Whether it's this or that news service or a person's name, whatever. Credit. But I offered to send all of the raw material on DVDs for them to pick and choose whatever shots they needed that molded their story to fit the message. As it turned out, that was a huge hit with the producers. Clean video. The cleaner it is, the better the program looks. And I wanted it to look as good as possible along with me, so I provided them with HD video and got the credit too which is very rare.

DI: The anniversary of the Erskine Fire is roughly a month away. What are the impressions/takeaways of the incident, especially the damage done by the fire, and the local communities that helped support those impacted by the fire?

DJ: June 23 of any year after 2016 will be remembered. I believe I can say with confidence that everyone from the evacuees and the first responders all gained a new respect for fire that day. The property clearance date was changed from June 15 to June 1, and fines for first offenses have gone up. All of that is fine as long as people get the message. But there will always be some form of contributing factor that spells out the recipe for disaster.

In the case of South Lake, it was a combination of a Wind Advisory which was in effect, and an ember landing in the wrong place. With so many mobile homes and the way they were lined up including the wind, it was essentially the same thing as lighting one edge of a book of matches and watching it work it's way to the other side. Matches are quicker, but it was essentially the same concept. Fuel, heat and a spark.

So although better preparations could be made to aid firefighters in saving property as well as saving your own, help yourself and your neighbor if you spot a potential problem.

Unless everyone works together this will happen again. Maybe not in the Is-

abella area or anytime soon, but it's just a matter of time until all the right elements for a major fire come together in the wrong place. Although there will never be any right place. I'm sure the efforts made here in Ridgecrest and other surrounding communities in the area made a big difference in recovery. I know that because I talked with people who benefitted from that. But I also think the people working the recovery centers were affected in a painful way as well. You could see the pain in the victims' eyes. I think everyone developed a deeper understanding of fire principals after Erskine, and many found a better way of life after helping the victims of that fire.

The understanding I came away with was everyone who helped in any way was affected one way or another. Watching people come together in such a crisis was bittersweet. Watching people who were affected and watching people helping people who were affected was amazing in itself, and I witnessed and documented a lot of that as well. I didn't just shoot the fire, I also collected hours of aftermath and some of the recovery assistance, too.

Having said all of that, the short answer to your question is; nobody will ever forget June 23 in the Lake Isabella area. Practically everyone who lives there knows someone who lost their homes. I think we were all impressed that day of how fast fire can move, and what you can't do when you have limited resources. When everything is on fire, what do firefighters do? Especially when water is limited because power was lost in the valley, thus preventing wells from replenishing. But I guess the takeaway is never say it can't happen to you, because it can. Whether you're living in a stick built home or a mobile, given the proper conditions something like this could happen again.

All affected can see that now, but it's unfortunate it took two people's lives and several homes for that to happen. People will continue to come together in such a time, and especially around here. The communities around here are very strong and supportive. More times than not, I think that makes the difference.

DI: Any other reflections?

tions?

DJ: When I shot the Chimney fire I was more afraid I would witness someone lose their home after I got them evacuating all their personal belongings, but thankfully that never happened. Erskine was a lot different. There was nothing anybody could do. Power was cut by the fire, so the wells weren't replenishing. Who couldn't see that scenario played out, right? But knowing that while I was shooting didn't help. I knew I was going to see a lot of [stuff] burn, and witness a lot of property loss. And it wasn't an easy thing to do then, anymore than it is to watch it again now. If I said I haven't shed a few tears over the Erskine Fire, I'd be a liar. Sometimes all it takes is the mere mention of the word "Erskine" to trigger an emotion or a tear.

I am giving 60 Minutes first crack at the incident, and I'll follow up with the documentary I'm working on after that. I guess I was in the right place at the wrong time, I don't know. Sometimes it feels that way.

Here are a few things Joyce said to me. "I appreciate the editorial value you bring to the process" after me offering raw clips, and, "I am happy to be able to tell you that our piece is airing this upcoming Sunday." "Our piece?" I guess it essentially was. I mean after all, it's not every day you get to watch a mobile home erupt into flames, and propane tanks blowing up and catch it on video. Normally I would flinch, like take my viewfinder off the action to actually witness it. But I didn't. Maybe that made all the difference in the world to them, that I stayed on target. But it was very difficult to do.

Joyce said she thought I'd like the finished result, although I'm not yet certain whether or not I'll be able to watch it. Don't get me wrong. I'm sure the story is good. So good in fact that I won't really realize what all I captured until it's displayed in a broadcast format. I just wanted to keep it clean and as professional as possible. I think that really played its part in the structured relationship we've attained. Although I am not thankful that I actually caught history in the making, I am satisfied with the thought that people might actually get something from the segment.

BLM initiates Stage 3 fire conditions in the California Desert District

MORENO VALLEY, Calif. – The Bureau of Land Management (BLM) has initiated Stage III Fire Restrictions for BLM-managed public lands within Los Angeles, San Bernardino, Riverside, Imperial, Inyo, Kern, and San Diego counties. The restrictions will remain in effect until further notice.

"Despite heavy winter rains, restrictions are needed due to current hot and dry weather conditions and an abundance of dry grass that could be easily ignited," said California Desert District Manager Beth Ransel. "These types of hot and dry weather conditions can lead to wildfires that would threaten public land visitors, adjacent private lands and communities, and natural resources."

Stage III Restrictions state that setting, building, maintaining, attending, or using open fire of any kind is prohibited in designated areas. Controlled flame devices, such as portable stoves fueled by petroleum or liquid petroleum gas products, are allowed only by permit. Smoking is only permitted within enclosed vehicles or camp trailers. The posses-

sion or use of all fireworks, including "safe and sane", as well as the use of floating sky lanterns, fire balloons or acetylene balloons is prohibited. The 2017 Fire Restriction Order and a fire restriction map is available at:


www.blm.gov/programs/public-safety-and-fire/fire-and-aviation/regional-info/california/fire-restrictions

In addition, the BLM has initiated restrictions for recreational target shooting within western Riverside and San Diego counties for public lands managed by the El Centro and Palm Springs-South Coast Field Offices beginning May 26, 2017, and continuing until the end of fire season is declared. This order closes approximately four-million acres of public lands to recreational target shooting. Violation of this order is punishable by a fine up to \$1,000 or imprisonment of up to 12 months, or both. A map of the recreational shooting closure can be viewed at the website above. The BLM greatly appreciates the public's cooperation in helping to minimize the number of human-



caused wildfires. The public is reminded to exercise extreme caution when using fire and to follow these precautions:

- Make sure you have a five-foot circle cleared around your campfire.
- Be sure to have a shovel and plenty of water on hand and put the fire DEAD OUT before leaving.
- Make sure cigarettes or cigars are put out when finished and disposed of properly.
- Park motor vehicles away from locations where exhaust could cause grass or other combustibles to ignite.

Irwin 'Bud' Shull: Seabee, Sailor, family man

Irwin "Bud" Shull, 95, a World War II veteran, died in Ridgecrest May 4, 2014. Bud was born Sept. 20, 1921 in Lawrence, Kansas and later moved with his family to Tucson, Arizona when he was three years old.

During the Great Depression Bud's mother worked as a secretary for the Agricultural Adjustment Administration Organization that paid farmers not to grow crops. This created a need for surveyors to measure cropland not used. Bud's mother got young Bud a job surveying cropland earning \$4 a day to help support the family. This job along with his aptitude for science and mathematics convinced bud to become a civil engineer.

After graduating from Tucson Senior High School, Bud attended the University of Arizona where he majored in civil engineering. He was required to take Army ROTC. He was in the Horse Calvary as a cadet for the first two years of college until authorities discovered he was colorblind.

As a result he left the University of Arizona his junior year to enter the Navy V12 Officer Training Program at Notre Dame University, which had become naval reserve midshipman school. Graduating as a 90-day wonder, he was commissioned a line duty officer in the U.S. Navy on Jan 20, 1944.

Despite his engineering degree the Navy initially planned to make him a ship driver and wend him in on the invasion of Italy. But the very next day the Navy changed his designator

from the star of a line officer to the crossed oak leaves of the Civil Engineering Corps.

Bud appeared to be destined for a career with the Naval Construction Battalions, the "Seabees." He was sent to camp Perry, Virginia for training. While he was stationed there, he married Dorothy Jean Poor his grade school sweetheart and they were married for 63 years!

After training, Bud received orders to report to the Ninth District in Chicago, Ill. He was to travel to all of the naval stations in this largest naval district to inventory heavy construction equipment, which was in short supply, for shipment to the Seabees. This proved to be futile as most stations were short of equipment.

But Bud felt it was a personal success since Dot was allowed to go with him so the Navy paid for his honeymoon!

New orders soon came directing Bud to Camp Parks, California for more training in preparation for assignment to a construction battalion heading to the pacific theater. Once again circumstances changed his assignment.

As two ships were being loaded with ammunition at the Port Chicago Naval Ammunition Depot on July 17, 1944, a massive explosion at 10:18 pm precipitated one of the worst stateside disasters in U.S. history.

The 1,200-foot long wooden pier, the locomotive and boxcars, both ships with crews and 320 workers were lost. A total of 386 men died in the explosion, which was heard over 200

miles away; one completed ship was vaporized.

The Navy convened a board to investigate claims from property owners and businesses in the vicinity of the explosion. Bud and 11 other junior officers were each teamed up with a chief petty officer with years of construction experience to investigate the numerous claims. Oakland and San Francisco were only about 30 miles away and suffered relatively minor damage. Most people patriotically took care of any damages and didn't apply for government help. In a few exceptional cases individuals thought the Navy would pay for some obvious old defects. The investigation team did not allow any such claims. After completion of the assignment Bud received orders to report to Port Hueneme to be shipped out for the Okinawa invasion, which was to be the biggest invasion ever.

Halfway to the Hawaiian Islands, the ship transporting Bud blew its boiler and was diverted to Pearl Harbor for repairs. This delay caused all on board to miss the initial invasion of Okinawa but they did arrive in time for the mop up.

So, Bud became part of the 40 Seabee battalions on Okinawa, 40,000 men with all the necessary equipment and supplies for the final invasion of Japan. This was the most Seabees gathered in one place at the same time. The Seabees, a major element in the invasion of Japan proper, would no doubt have suffered terrible casualties.

The atomic bombs dropped on Japan on Aug.

6 and 9th made the invasion no longer necessary.

Bud said those two bombs might have saved 2 million lives! Including his own. He had nightmares of his body washing up of the bloody shores.

Now World War II was over but not for Bud. He had to stay long enough to ditch hundreds of pieces of heavy equipment into the ocean, Bud finally came home was discharged from the Navy but later joined the naval reserves.

In 1951 Bud and his family moved to China Lake and began life as a civil servant for the Naval Ordnance Test Station. In 1954, along with Cmdr. Fran Cuniff, also a WWII CB officer, Bud was instrumental in starting the first Seabee reserve battalion at China Lake. Bud was the first commanding officer and served until 1961. The unit completed moving tons of earth to create what is now the China Lake Golf Course.

Bud retired from the active reserve in 1969. As a civil servant at China Lake, he served as branch head in the aviation ordinance test department, then became a division head in the public works department, where he worked for twelve years.

In 1971 Bud was sent on a three-year assignment to Washington, DC.

On a presidential survey committee group whose purpose was to eliminate the military's underutilized real property.

Bud completed this assignment so well he received another three-year assignment in Washington, this time in the office of the director of navy labora-

tories where he worked on planning the future of RDT&E activities.

After retirement in 1978 Bud and dot retired. They were able to travel extensively abroad and in their airstream trailer.

They became involved with habitat for humanity, Buds' personal life ministry in 1993 caravanning from affiliate to affiliate helping low income families build their own homes.

In 1998 they returned to Ridgecrest and helped start Habitat for Humanity of the IWW.

After his beloved wife Dot of 62 years passed away Bud married Dorothy Jean Shary. He spent 8 wonderful years with "DJ."

Bud went peacefully to his great reward on May 4, 2017 with family at his bedside.

A Memorial Day memory

A tear welled up in Hal's eye, a deep sadness etched across his face as he recalled the moment. Omaha Beach, the day after the D-Day invasion. Hal had been tasked by his company commander to go back down onto the beach and retrieve some equipment. A farm boy from Iowa now deep into his 60s, he shared this memory with me, his words below.

"It was a beautiful day — the sun was out, the sky blue, the water calm. But there on the sandy beach stretching out before me on down the beach were the bodies, the carnage from the day before. It was so peaceful and quiet and...and..." Hal's voice trailed off into muted silence as he slowly shook his head, his emotions overwhelmed by that graphic, gripping image from forty years earlier, still as real to him as the day he had experienced it. All gave some, some gave all.

If Memorial Day is about remembering the past sacrifices of our men and women in the military, Hal's five minutes of emotional recall was the best and most real Memorial Day I've ever had. On that 66th day of June in 1944 when Hal stood alone on the beach at Normandy — alone in the company of fallen comrades — I was five years old, my mother preparing me for kindergarten that fall.

I would be free to go to school, salute the American flag in the corner of our classroom, and sing "My country 'tis of thee, sweet land of liberty." But only because, "while all gave some, some did give all" making the ultimate sacrifice that allowed fathers to go to work, mothers to care for their children, and kids like me to go to school.



The wars that purchased our freedom at the price of the blood and bravery of men and women we likely never knew were largely fought overseas. 130,000 American soldiers, sailors, marines, coast guardsmen, and airmen are still there, buried under foreign soil or waters where they repelled an enemy intent on taking away the freedom we enjoy today. That's "paying forward" like no other debt was or ever could be — their sacrifice measured starkly in numbers. 116,500 died in WW I; 405,300 in WW II; and another 101,000 in Korea, Vietnam, the Gulf War, Iraq, and Afghanistan.

But behind the numbers are the faces. An article about the USS Arizona on the 75th anniversary of Pearl Harbor last December ran in several papers with a sketch of that massive ship sinking, a large grey cloud in the background. But only when you looked more closely at the sketch could you see that the cloud was composed of faces, perhaps a hundred or more, symbolizing the thousand-plus men who went to a watery grave that day and still lie entombed there.

Personalizing such faces makes Memorial Day deeper if you have the honor of being linked to someone

who served. My link was remote — my parents bought our first house in Ohio from a man who lost two sons — his only children — on the USS Arizona. They were still teenagers, robbed of the rest of their lives that we might have ours free and clear.

And I also think about David Acheson and Jeffrey M. Wershow, both outstanding college leaders who left school to serve their country. David died at Gettysburg at age 23. He surely would have been a leader, likely a lawyer and judge like his father and grandfather, had he lived. And Jeff, who died in Iraq in 2003 at age 22, was nicknamed "the General" because of his confident and purposeful manner. He would have excelled in any field — had he only lived. These two fine young men and thousands more represent the true cost of war — what might have been.

Make this Memorial Day as personal as you can — by visiting a grave and leaving flowers, a flag, or a prayer; by asking a veteran, perhaps a family member or neighbor, to share what they're willing to share about their service experiences. My friend Hal, who has since passed away, gave me a rare gift by sharing a vivid memory of historic sacrifice for our country. "Greater love hath no man than this, that he lay down his life for his friends." Many did just that for the country they loved. May we never forget.

The American Legion Post 684 will hold its annual Memorial Day ceremony Monday, May 29 at 10 a.m. at the Desert Memorial Park on San Bernardino County Line Road. The guest speaker will be Cmdr. Matt Conliffe, executive officer of Naval Air Weapons Station China Lake. Master of Ceremonies will be the American Legion's Tom Llewellyn, who has participated in the event for 28 years.

According to Al Hill, with the Legion, the organization has been conducting the Memorial Day service since 1965. Prior

to that, the service was held at the post starting in 1947.

The service will include the opening ceremony and prayer, followed by the guest speaker and a wreath laying ceremony.

"This consists of all the organizations in the valley putting up wreaths for past veterans," Hill said.

A buffet reception will be held at the American Legion, 641 Inyokern Road, following ceremony. The event traditionally draws a few hundred people each year, and is coordinated through volunteer effort.

Memorial Day honors and remembers the men and women who died while serving in the armed forces.

It originated Decoration Day following the Civil War, in which the "the Grand Army of the Republic, an organization of Union veterans founded in Decatur, Illinois, established it as a time for the nation to decorate the graves of the Union war dead with flowers."

Memorial Day came about after World War II (officially recognized by that name by Congress in 1967). Congress declared Memorial Day a national holiday under the Uniform Monday Holiday Act in 1968, which took effect in 1971. The act established Memorial Day as being the last Monday of May, moving it from its traditional May 30 observation.

Tomb of the Unknown Soldier

Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, Arlington National Cemetery

The Tomb of the Unknown Soldier at Arlington National Cemetery stands atop a hill overlooking Washington, D.C. On March 4, 1921, Congress approved the burial of an unidentified American soldier from World War I in the plaza of the new Memorial Amphitheater.

The white marble sarcophagus has a flat-faced form and is relieved at the corners and along the sides by neoclassic pilasters, or columns, set into the surface. Sculpted into the east panel which faces Washington, D.C., are three Greek figures representing Peace, Victory, and

Valor. The six wreaths, three sculpted on each side, represent the six major campaigns of World War I. Inscribed on the back of the Tomb are the words:

"Here rests in honored glory an American soldier known but to God."

The Tomb sarcophagus was placed above the grave of the Unknown Soldier of World War I. West of the World War I Unknown are the crypts of unknowns from World War II, Korea and Vietnam. Those three graves are marked with white marble slabs flush with the plaza.

Korean War Veterans Memorial

Remember over 5 million American veterans who fought and those who gave their lives for the cause of freedom at The Korean War Veterans Memorial.

From 1950 to 1953, the United States joined with United Nations forces in Korea to take a stand against what was deemed a threat to democratic nations worldwide. At war's end, a million and a half Amer-

ican veterans returned to a peacetime world of families, homes, and jobs - and to a country long reluctant to view the Korean War as something to memorialize. But to the men and women who served, the Korean War could never be a forgotten war.

The Korean War Veterans Memorial honors those Americans who answered the call, those who worked and fought under the trying of circumstances, and those who gave their lives for the cause of freedom.

Vietnam Veterans Memorial

Located north of the Lincoln Memorial near the intersection of 22nd St. and Constitution Ave. NW, Vietnam Veterans Memorial is free to visit and is open 24 hours a day.

The memorial includes the names of over 58,000 servicemen and women who gave their lives in service in the Vietnam Conflict. The memorial also includes "The Three Servicemen" statue and the Vietnam Women's Memorial. When a visitor looks upon the wall, his or her reflection can be seen simultaneously with the engraved names, which is meant to symbolically bring the past and present together. One wall points toward the Washington Monument, the other in

the direction of the Lincoln Memorial, meeting at an angle of 125° 12'. Each wall has 72 panels, 70 listing names (numbered 1E through 70E and 70W through 1W) and two very small blank panels at the extremities. There is a pathway along the base of the Wall where visitors may walk.

The main part of the memorial, which was completed in 1982, is in Constitution Gardens adjacent to the National Mall, just northeast of the Lincoln Memorial. The memorial is maintained by the U.S. National Park Service, and receives around 3 million visitors each year. The Memorial Wall was designed by American architect Maya Lin.

USS Arizona Memorial, Honolulu, Hawaii

The USS Arizona Memorial, at Pearl Harbor in Honolulu, Hawaii, marks the resting place of 1,102 of the 1,177 sailors and Marines killed on USS Arizona (BB-39) during the Japanese surprise attack on Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941 and commemorates the events of that day. The attack on Pearl Harbor and the island of O'ahu led to the United States' direct involvement in World War II.

The memorial, built in 1962, is visited by more than

two million people annually. Accessible only by boat, it straddles the sunken hull of the battleship without touching it. Historical information about the attack, shuttle boats to and from the memorial, and general visitor services are available at the associated USS Arizona Memorial Visitor Center, which opened in 1980 and is operated by the National Park Service. The battleship's sunken remains were declared a National Historic Landmark on May 5, 1989.

World War II Memorial

The World War II memorial honors the 16 million who served in the armed forces of the U.S. during World War II, the more than 400,000 who died, and the millions who supported the war effort from home. Symbolic of the defining event of the 20th Century, the memorial is a monument to the spirit, sacrifice, and commitment of the American people to the common defense of the nation and to the

broader causes of peace and freedom from tyranny throughout the world. It will inspire future generations of Americans, deepening their appreciation of what the World War II generation accomplished in securing freedom and democracy. Above all, the memorial stands as an important symbol of American national unity, a timeless reminder of the moral strength and awesome power that can flow when a free people are at once united and bonded together in a common and just cause.

World War I Memorial

The memorial honors citizens of the District of Columbia who fought in World War I. It was authorized by Congress in 1924, but funding to construct the memorial came exclusively from people and businesses in the District and no federal funds were used. Construction began in the spring of 1931, and it was dedicated on November 11, 1931 (Armistice Day).

The Neoclassical memorial was designed by architects Frederick H. Brooke, Horace W. Peaslee, and Nathan C. Wyeth. It's 47 feet tall, and features a circular peristyle of 12 Doric columns, each 22 feet high, supporting a drum. Atop the drum is a corbelled dome (a series of horizontal rings, each one of which is slightly cantilevered inward).

A four-foot high, 43-foot, 5-inch wide marble base has

steps cut into it on the north and south. Inscribed on the base are the names of the 499 D.C. residents who lost their lives in the war, and medallions representing the branches of the armed forces.

The concrete foundation of the structure is set deep into the earth, supported by pilings. Slate walkways lead to and from the structure on the north and south side, and surround it.

Cavs-Warriors Part III joins past championship trilogies

It never happened between Magic Johnson's Lakers and Larry Bird's Celtics. Same for Michael Jordan and Karl Malone or Jerry West and Bill Russell.

While there have been 14 rematches in NBA Finals history, this year's meeting between LeBron James' Cleveland Cavaliers and Stephen Curry's Golden State Warriors will be the first trilogy in league history.

After the Warriors beat the Cavs for their first title in 40 years in 2015, Cleveland got revenge last season with a comeback from 3-1 down to give the city its first major championship since 1964. Now they meet for the rubber match starting June 1 in Oakland.

While this may be unprecedented in the NBA, it has happened once before

in the NFL, NHL and Major League Baseball with matchups that included some of those sports' biggest stars.

There was Babe Ruth vs. Frankie Frisch in the 1920s and then a pair of memorable three-peat matchups in the 1950s featuring Otto Graham against Bobby Layne in the NFL and Gordie Howe against Maurice Richard in the NHL.

Here is a look at other major pro sports championship trilogies:

New York Yankees vs. New York Giants 1921-23

In his second season in New York, Babe Ruth led the Yankees to their first World Series berth in 1921 against the Giants. The entire series was played at the Polo Grounds, home to both teams that season. The Giants won the Series 5-3 in the final best-of-nine matchup as a banged-up Ruth got just one plate appearance during

the final three games, all won by the Giants.

John McGraw's Giants won the rematch the following year 4-0 with one tie before Ruth gave the Yankees their first title the following year to cap the first season at Yankee Stadium. Ruth had three homers in the Series, including one in the decisive sixth game. The big star for the Giants that year was future Yankees manager Casey Stengel, who hit an inside-the-park homer in the ninth inning to win Game 1 and drove in the only run in Game 3 with another homer.

Cleveland Browns vs. Detroit Lions (1952-54)

These teams that have spent much of the post-merger days near the bottom of the standings were the cream of the crop in the 1950s led by star

Getting to Grand Junction means you've made it to the JUCO World Series. And for every junior college player, that has been the dream destination since 1959, with Suplizio Field

and its majestic mountain backdrop serving as host.

"When I look back, I can say one of my favorite times I ever had on the baseball field and one of the greatest years of my life was playing JUCO," Harper says of playing in 2010 for the College of Southern Nevada in the upcoming book, "JUCO's Journey."

"And the JUCO World Series," he added, "was icing on the cake."

Kirby Puckett played

there in 1982 with Triton College, years before he won two World Series with the Minnesota Twins on his way to the Hall of Fame. Long before his bloody sock became the stuff of Red Sox legend, Curt Schilling took the mound for Yavapai College in 1986.

The likes of Gary Gentry, Kurt Bevacqua, Jim Leyritz, Eric Gagne, Travis Hafner, Cliff Lee, John Lackey, Adam LaRoche and Brandon Belt are also on the list

of more than 120 future major leaguers who have played on junior college baseball's biggest stage.

Similar to its NCAA Division I counterpart in Omaha, Nebraska, the JUCO World Series is fully embraced by Grand Junction, a city of about 60,000 located nearly 250 miles west-southwest of Denver. The weeklong celebration of baseball has been in the
